Project Description:

The programme aims to provide immediate humanitarian relief to Palestinians through the implementation of various projects in the areas of education, water, and municipal infrastructure development

Objectives:

1. To create short term employment opportunities.
2. To provide humanitarian relief in essential areas of social infrastructure
3. To provide capacity building to local counterparts

Locations:

184 projects are located throughout the 11 districts of the West Bank, including Jenin, Tulkarem, Qalqiliya, Tubas, Nablus, Salfeet, Ramallah, Jericho, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, and Hebron.

Products (as of end – May 2006):

- 24 of 25 Community Service building have been completed.
- 9 of 10 schools benefiting from Additional Classrooms have been completed.
- The Vocational Training Centre in Qalqilya has been constructed and furniture and equipment is currently being purchased.
- 55 new sanitary units were constructed and 22 rehabilitated. 629 sanitary units holes either are new or rehabilitated.
- House water cistern works at 30 project sites completed. In total 695 house water cisterns were built.
- 32 project sites encompassing storm water canals were constructed.
- 12 water supply and distribution system projects including water reservoirs, house water connections, networks, and distribution systems have been rehabilitated or constructed.

Outputs:

The programme provided improvement in the quality and access to water, resources, relieved over-crowding in public schools, provided for a healthier sanitary environment, and provided the necessary infrastructure for essential services such as clinics, kindergartens, and woman and youth associations.
